Pope Francis' pandemic prayer 5 years later: 'Why are you afraid? Have you no faith?'

Prancis' historic "Statio Orbis" blessing during the height of the COVID-19 pandemic remains relevant for the Church



as it did five years ago. Before an empty and raincovered St. Peter's Square, Pope Francis held Eucharistic adoration and gave an extraordinary urbi et orbi blessing, praying for the world during the coronavirus pandemic.

The Holy Hour on March 27, 2020, included a reading from the Gospel and a meditation by Pope Francis, who spoke about faith and trust in God during a time when people fear for their lives, as did the disciples when their boat was caught in a violent storm.

During the special moment of prayer on March 27, 2020, the Holy Father spoke about faith amid crisis — "Why are you afraid? Have you no faith?"

These powerful words were a papal refrain throughout his 2020 address before an empty St. Peter's Square.

'Why are you afraid? Have you no faith?' Lord, your word this evening strikes us and regards us, all of us. In this world, that you love more than we do, we have gone ahead at breakneck speed, feeling powerful and able to do anything. Greedy for profit, we let ourselves get caught up in things and lured away by haste," he prayed.

Pope Francis implored people to believe in God's presence during the time of COVID-19 when he spoke of Jesus' reaction to the cry of the disciples: "Teacher, do you not care if we perish?" recorded in chapter 4 of St. Mark's Gospel.

The pandemic's impact on the life of the Church is yet to be fully researched and understood.

Recent studies from around the world suggest a decline in Church attendance in some regions. A new Pew study shows thousands of people have chosen to leave behind the religion of their childhood in some of the traditionally Catholic countries such as Italy and Spain. At the same time, the study acknowledges the report's figures "are not necessarily representative of the entire world's population."

While religious belief and practice may seem to be weakening in some parts of the world, the Holy Father's "Statio Orbis" prayer five years ago can still resonate with millions of people of faith who trust and hope in God's presence in times of world suffering and hardship.

According to the Vatican's 2025 Annuario Pontificio, the Catholic Church has grown worldwide after the COVID-19 pandemic, with the highest growth recorded in Africa. Between 2022 and 2023, the global Catholic population has grown from approximately 1.39 billion Catholics to 1.406 billion in the last two years. (Source: VA News)

Found Alive Again



In today's First Reading, God forgives "the reproach" of the generations who grumbled against Him after the Exodus. On the threshold of the promised land, Israel can with a clean heart celebrate the Passover, the feast of God's firstborn son (see Joshua 5:6–7; Exodus 4:22; 12:12–13).

Reconciliation is also at the heart of the story Jesus tells in today's Gospel. The story of the Prodigal Son is the story of Israel and of the human race. But it is also the story of every believer.

In Baptism, we're given a divine birthright, made "a new creation," as Paul puts it in today's Epistle. But when we sin, we're like the Prodigal Son, quitting our Father's house, squandering our inheritance in trying to live without Him.

Lost in sin, we cut ourselves off from the grace of sonship lavished upon us in Baptism. It is still possible for us to come to our senses, make our way back to the Father, as the prodigal does.

But only He can remove the reproach and restore the divine sonship we have spurned. Only He can free us from the slavery to sin that causes us—like the Prodigal Son—to see God not as our Father but as our master, One we serve as slaves.

God wants not slaves but children. Like the father in today's Gospel, He longs to call each of us "My son," to share His life with us, to tell us: "Everything I have is yours."

The Father's words of longing and compassion still come to His prodigal children in the Sacrament of Penance. This is part of what Paul today calls "the ministry of reconciliation" entrusted by Jesus to the Apostles and the Church.

Reconciled like Israel, we take our place at the table of the Eucharist, the homecoming banquet the Father calls for His lost sons, the new Passover we celebrate this side of heaven. We taste the goodness of the Lord, as we sing in today's Psalm, rejoicing that we who were dead are found alive again.

Second Collection for Diocesan Clergy Training Fund this Sunday

he Clergy Assistance Fund contributes to the work of the Department for Clergy Team. The Department for Clergy, which has four members of staff, exists to provide care and support for the ordained in our Diocese. The Diocese of Portsmouth is responsible for supporting the diocesan clergy in active ministry, those from religious orders, the Personal Ordinariate of Our Lady of Walsingham or overseas, and our retired priests, who with dedication and care serve our parishes, chaplaincies, schools, outreach and mission: bringing people closer to Jesus Christ through His Church. This appeal resources our Diocese to assist our priests towards holiness, happiness and health - to serve those who serve us.

The Clergy Support Team is responsible for looking after the welfare, ongoing formation and personal support of our clergy, such as the provision of spiritual direction, counselling, appraisal, ongoing formation and practical advice. It organises retreats, ministerial formation days, courses and sabbaticals. It looks after the junior clergy, the overseas clergy and especially the retired clergy. It is the principal mechanism through which the Bishop looks after the wellbeing of the

clergy. Parishioners are welcome to pay by cash to our collectors at the end of the mass, by our DONA device for contactless payment or scanning the QR code to access the online payment of Give as You Live.



Jubilee Pilgrimage to Lourdes

o you want to join a pilgrimage to Lourdes with others across the Diocese of Portsmouth in the year of Jubilee this summer? Led by Canon PJ Smith and facilitated by Joe Walsh Tours, the five-day trip to Lourdes will take place from 7th to 11th July. It costs £879 each (Youth Price: £825) including flights, coaches, accommodation and full religious programme directed by Canon PJ Smith. The pilgrimage always includes the key Lourdes experiences. There include Torchlight and Blessed Sacrament processions, International Mass, walking in the footsteps of St Bernadette, visit the Grotto, stations of the cross and responding to Our Lady's call to bathe in the spring waters. Furthermore, pilgrims will take a trip into the mountains, taking in the Hautes-Pyrenees culture and for the brave, a mountain hike! Young people are espe-

cially invited to participate in the great tradition of service in Lourdes. People of all ages travel to Lourdes to seek healing in the spring waters and spiritual renewal and wouldn't be able to participate in the pilgrimage if it wasn't for teams of volunteers pushing wheelchairs, assisting them around town.

They will also need some spending money in Rome to buy refreshments, lunch and any souvenirs they would like to bring home!
