is Holiness Pope Francis has appointed Bishop Philip Moger as the new Bishop of Plymouth. To be installed, Saturday 9 November at the Cathedral Church of St

Mary and St Boniface, Plymouth. A priest of the Diocese of Leeds for over 40 years, Bishop Moger has, until now, served as an Auxiliary Bishop for the Archdiocese of Southwark.

Message from Bishop Philip Moger

Following the news of his appoint-ment, Bishop Moger said: "I'm very hon-oured to be asked by Pope Francis to be the 10th Bishop of this great Diocese of Plymouth. I know that the diocese has been without a bishop for the last two



years, so I am very grateful to Canon Paul Cummins, who has administered the diocese during the vacancy so ably and generously, and all who have supported him. I look forward to visiting and getting to know the clergy, religious and lay faithful in this beautiful part of the Lord's vinevard.

"At the same time. I shall very much miss the Archdiocese of Southwark, where I've been privileged to minister for the last 18 months. The Archbishop, my fellow Auxiliary Bishop, clergy, reli-gious and lay faithful quickly took me to themselves and gave me their love, friendship and encouragement.

Brief biography of Bishop-elect Philip Moger Born in 1955, Bishop-elect Philip Moger grew up in Halifax, Yorkshire. His mother died when he up in Halifax, Yorkshire. His mother died when he was five and he was raised by his grandmother and father. He began his working life in banking and then entered St Cuthbert's Seminary at Ushaw in County Durham to begin studies for the priesthood. He was ordained for the Diocese of Leeds in 1982 and was appointed an assistant priest at St Urban's, Headingley, also serving as a chaplain to the local school, a Sue Ryder home and a hospital for people with learning difficulties. In 1985 he was appointed to the Diocesan Pastoral Centre in Ilkley to serve the renewal of narishes and schools.

the renewal of parishes and schools. In 1992 he was appointed an assistant at Leeds Cathedral and was also appointed as Vocations Director. He served as bishop's secretary and as a parish priest in parishes in Bradford and Leeds.

In 2008, he returned to Leeds Cathedral as Dean. He was appointed a Prelate of Honour, with the title Monsignor, and subsequently a Canon of the Cathedral Chapter. He chaired the Diocese of Leeds Liturgical Commission, was Director of Lit-urgy of the Diocese of Leeds Lourdes Pilgrimage and use also graceshift for the liturate of the prime to and was also responsible for the liturgies during the Papal Visit of Pope Benedict XVI to Great Britain in 2010.

In September 2020, he took up the appointment as the Rector of the National Shrine of Our Lady of Walsingham in Norfolk.

Following the Messiah

n today's Gospel, we reach a pivotal moment in our walk with the Lord. After weeks deeds, along with the disciples we're asked to decide who Jesus truly is.

Peter answers for them, and for us, too, when he declares: "You are the Messiah." Many expected the Messiah to be a miracle worker who would vanquish Israel's enemies and restore the kingdom of David (see John 6:15).

Jesus today reveals a different portrait. He calls Himself the Son of Man, evoking the royal figure Daniel saw in his heavenly visions (see Daniel 7:13–14). But Jesus' kingship is not to be of this world (see John 18:36). And the path to His throne, as He reveals, is by way of suffering and death.

Jesus identifies the Messiah with the suffering servant that Isaiah foretells in today's First Reading. The words of Isaiah's servant are Jesus' words-as He gives Himself to be shamed



and beaten, trusting that God will be His help. We hear our Lord's voice again in today's Psalm, as He gives thanks that God has freed Him from the cords of death.

As Jesus tells us today, to believe that He is the Messiah is to follow His way of selfdenial—losing our lives to save them in order to rise with Him to new life. Our faith, we hear again in today's Epistle, must express itself in works of love (see Galatians 5:6).

Notice that Jesus questions the Apostles today "along the way." They are on the way to Jerusalem, where the Lord will lay down His life. We, too, are on a journey with the Lord.

We must take up our cross, giving to others and enduring all our trials for His sake and the sake of the Gospel.

Our lives must be an offering of thanksgiving for the new life He has given us until that day when we reach our destination and walk before the Lord in the land of the living.

Archbishop Mark O'Toole announces creation of the united Archdiocese of Cardiff-Menevia



n a pastoral letter to be read across the Archdiocese of Cardiff-Menevia on the weekend of 14-15 September, Archbishop Mark O'Toole shared the joyful news of the creation of the new Archdiocese of Cardiff-Menevia.

The announcement was promulgated from Rome, following the decision of Pope Francis, on 12 September, coinciding with the Feast of the Holy Name of Mary. This significant moment marks a new chapter for the Catholic community in South Wales and Herefordshire.

"We are immensely grateful to Pope Francis for this decision and for his inspiring leadership in encouraging us to 'go outwards' in mission," Archbishop Mark wrote. He added, "We received this decision more quickly than anticipated, which I believe reflects the confidence the Holy See has in the

process we have undertaken." He also highlighted the significance of the decision being made on the Feast of the Holy Name of Mary and expressed his gratitude to the lay faithful, religious, deacons, and priests for their continued support and engagement, which have been integral to this process. In the first five months of 2024, the Archdiocese of Cardiff and the Diocese of Menevia conducted a series

of Open Listening Sessions across both dioceses to gauge people's views on the proposed unification. Archbish-op Mark personally attended 42 meetings, which were attended by 605 people, both clergy and laity. Written submissions were also received. The final dossier was submitted to the Nuncio, who relayed it to the Holy See in July, leading to this prompt decision.

Walsingham Prepares for the Arrival of Three Augustinian Friars The National Shrine of Our Lady, at Walsingham, is preparing to welcome Fr Sunday Ikpe OSA (Prior), Fr Charles Chimaobi OSA, and Fr Eric Taru OSA, who will each be ministering at the Shrine and to pilgrims as members of the Shrine Team from October 2024. Upon their arrival in mid-September the Friars will experience a short period of orientation, and then begin an extended programme of induction

into the life, mission, and dynamics of the National Shrine of Our Lady. The Friars will minister under the su-

pervision of the Shrine's Rector, Rev Dr Robert Billing. In advance of the forthcoming Jubilee year, this project is a significant moment in the life and history of the National Shrine of Our Lady, at Walsingham. The famous Priory (often known today as 'the Abbey'), and famed Marian Shrine, which housed the original replica Holy House of Nazareth, was administered by Augustinian Canons from 1153 all the way up to the medieval Shrine's dismantling, and the Priory's subsequent de-struction in 1538, at the hands of Henry VIII's commissioners.

Fr Billing commented upon the imminent arrival of the Friars to the Shrine:

"After much hard work behind the scenes and the support of the local Bishop, I am delighted that the Nigerian Province of the Augustinian Order has responded so generously to my request and that three young Friars will soon be among us for service at the Shrine in Walsingham. Their arrival, the establishment of a new Priory in service of the Shrine, and their ministry here not only promises so much for the future mission of the Shrine but also pays rich tribute for the Augustinian tradition of Canons that faithfully served the Shrine from the 12th century, until the Shrine was tragically dismantled, and the priory destroyed, at the time of the English Reformation.

Fr Billing concluded: "We give thanks to Almighty God, Our Lady of Walsingham, and Saint Augustine of Hippo that we can soon rejoice in the restoration of the spirituality and service of the Augustinian Order to our restored and vibrant holy Shrine and place of pilgrimage today."
