The focus of the encyclical is on the Human and Divine Love of the Heart of Jesus Christ. Cardinal's welcome

"In it we will find not only an echo of ourselves but an invitation to come close to the Heart of Jesus who brings to us the fulness of the love for which

we long.

"There we find the source of living water that moves us and enables us to reach out to others, to offer forgiveness, to make amends for our failings, to seek to build healing relationships of faithfulness

"In the Heart of Jesus we find the love we need in order to build a better world. As Pope Francis says: 'For it is by drinking of that same love that we become capable of forging bonds of fraternity, of recognizing the dignity of each human being, and of working together to care for our common home' (217).

"This is the testimony of Pope Francis, a testimony written in his heart and offered to the hearts of all."

# **Seeing the Son of David**

oday's Gospel turns on an irony—it is a blind man, Bartimaeus, who becomes the first person outside of the Apostles to recognize Jesus as the Messiah. And his



healing is the last miracle Jesus performs before entering the holy city of Jerusalem for His last week on earth.

The scene on the road to Jerusalem evokes the joyful procession prophesied by Jeremiah in today's First Reading. In Jesus this prophecy is fulfilled. God, through the Messiah, is delivering His people from exile, bringing them back from the ends of the earth, with the blind and lame in their midst.

Jesus, as Bartimaeus proclaims, is the longawaited Son promised to David (see 2 Samuel 7:12–16; Isaiah 11:9; Jeremiah 23:5). Upon His triumphal arrival in Jerusalem, all will see that the everlasting kingdom of David has come (see Mark 11:9–10).

As we hear in today's Epistle, the Son of David was expected to be the Son of God (see Psalm 2:7). He was to be a priest-king like Melchizedek (see Psalm 110:4), who offered bread and wine to God Most High at the dawn of salvation history (see Genesis 14:18–20).

Bartimaeus is a symbol of his people, the captive Zion of whom we sing in today's Psalm. His God has done great things for him. All his life has been sown in tears and weeping. Now, he

reaps a new life.

Bartimaeus, too, should be a sign for us. How often Christ passes us by—in the person of the poor, in the distressing guise of a troublesome family member or burdensome associate (see Matthew 25:31–46)—and yet we don't see Him.

Christ still calls to us through His Church, as Jesus sent His Apostles to call Bartimaeus. Yet how often are we found to be listening instead to the voices of the crowd, not hearing the words of His Church.

Today He asks us what He asks Bartimaeus: "What do you want me to do for you?" Rejoicing, let us ask the same thing of Him—what can we do for all that He has done for us?

Be Patient and The Beauty of the New Lectionary will be Revealed

he new lectionary will come into use on the First Sunday of Advent, and people around the country are beginning to receive their copies. Our General Secretary, Canon Christopher Thomas, General Secretary of the Catholic Bishops' Conference of England and Wales speaking on a monthly podcast At the Foot of the Cross, encourages Catholics to be patient, to sit with the text – a text designed for proclamation – and to see its beauty.



"We'll be using the English Standard Version – Catholic Edition, which is a beautiful text. It will be different from the Jerusalem Bible that we've used since 1970. When the New Missal translation was introduced in 2010/11, I can remember saying to the people in my parish, "It'll be like a new pair of shoes. Initially, it's going to ache a bit and it's going to scratch a bit and it's not going to feel right; but after a while, just with a new pair of shoes, the leather gets soft, and our feet fit in there better." This will be the same with this new lectionary because there is a richness to the new text.

There is a deeper theological understanding. There's a sense of freshness because we are looking at a text that has been developed. It's not the same as the Bible. I want to make that very clear. We have used this English Standard Version – Catholic Edition, as the basis of the lectionary, but there are significant differences. The use of inclusive language, for example. Wherever the Greek word adelphoi is used, which means 'brothers' in Greek, we shall use 'brothers and sisters' in the lectionary.

Save Energy, Save Money, Save the Planet

s November approaches, it's time to think about the winter and keeping warm for less whilst saving energy consumption. Window films are a cheap insulation solution, costing £15 to £50 per m2, ideal for homeowners on a budget. These transparent sheets reflect radiant heat back into the room, reducing heat loss while allowing natural light. Although less effective than double glazing, window films offer significant improvement at a fraction of the cost.
